BEEF CATTLE DEPARTMENT POLICIES

1. All health regulations apply. Papers will be checked at weigh-in. See exhibition rules.
2. Market animals are to be in the member's possession by the winter weigh in date..
3. All animals are to be tied with neck straps and halter.
4. Market animals will be shown by weight.
5. Exhibitors may show two animals in each class.
6. Identification rules apply to crossbred, breed, market heifer, and dairy steer classes. Animals are to be weighed and ear tagged with a county-issued tag at the county ID clinic held in the winter.
7. Beef animals will be weighed only one time.
8. Any Market Animal that does not meet the minimum weight (850 lbs.) will be eligible to show in separate class. Animals showing in this class will NOT be eligible for awards and animals showing in this class will not be eligible to sell. This will give the exhibitor an opportunity to complete their project.
9. An exhibitor may weigh in a maximum of 5 animals in each group (crossbred, breed, market heifers, and dairy steers) and show 2 (in each group) in the Junior Fair.
10. Market animals must be born after Jan. 1, 2019. Any questionable animal will be mouthed.
11. Horns will not be allowed on market or feeder cattle.
12. Animals and pens are to be clean at all times.
13. Animals must be in the owner's possession by: Market animals - by the nose printing date Feeder calves and junior heifer calf- July 1, 2020. All other females - May 1, 2019.
14. A \$5.00 premium will be awarded for each exhibited feeder calf and heifer. The premium for market beef will be deposited into the diverted premium account.
15. Family Market Animal - Families with more than (1) exhibitor will have the choice of purchasing one or more market beef animals and entering them under the family name rather than the name of an exhibitor from that family.



In the event one of the market animals that the exhibitor has checked in at the weigh in dies or for some reason the exhibitor does not want to bring them to the fair, or the exhibitor wants to show this as a 2nd Market Beef Animal, the "Family Market Animal" can be placed in the exhibitors name and shown at the Mercer County Fair.

The following rules will apply:

All "Family Market Beef Animals" must be brought to the identification/ weigh in. The exhibitor will be listed as "_____ Family". A separate Project Entry Form for this animal must be filled out with the Exhibitor listed as "_____Family".

All families entering a "Family Market Beef Animals" must advise the Beef Advisor as soon as possible, but no later than (1) hour after the deadline for the cattle to be in the barn at the Mercer County Fair, of the intentions for this animal. If it is going to be shown at the Mercer County Fair, the animal needs to be put in an exhibitors name. A completed Drug Use Notification Form must be filled out in the exhibitors name and presented at the weigh in at the Fair.

Eligible exhibitor must be an immediate member of the "_____ Family" and must have checked in an animal at the identification/weigh in. Animals already checked in under an exhibitor cannot be switched.

All Junior Fair rules apply for the exhibitor and animals.

Family Market Animals are NOT eligible to show at the Ohio State Fair.

16. DRESS CODE RULES APPLY. SEE GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES.
17. ALL beef cattle can NOT to be shown by any other exhibitor in any other county junior fair show.
18. **Anything that is in question, will be decided upon by the Beef Committee.**

DAIRY STEER

1. Animals are to be finished dairy steers No beef or crossbred (dairy/ beef) animals are to be shown.
2. Animals should be representative of dairy breeding .
3. All health regulations apply. See health rules.

FEEDER CALF

1. See health rules. Regulations apply.
2. Feeder calf is to be born after January 1 current year.
In the exhibitor's possession by July 1 current year.
3. Weight of animal must be 700 pounds or less.
4. Animal may be beef, crossbred or dairy.
5. Calf must be castrated.
6. Heifers are allowed in this class, but cannot be shown in both the feeder calf show and the heifer show.
7. **All feeder calves must have a farm ear tag in their ear. This tag number is to be recorded in the member's record book and stated on the member's beef entry form.**

MARKET HEIFER

1. A Market Heifer is a beef heifer sired by a beef bull. (NO Dairy characteristics.)
2. The heifer must be intended for market (slaughter) purposes only, and not for breeding purposes.
3. Must be born after 1/1/19, and in exhibitor's possession by the day of the weigh in.
4. The Market Heifers will show in a separate class along with the market steers. The champion Market Heifer will compete against the Crossbred and Breed for the Grand and Reserve Market Beef Animal. (No separate Born & Raised Market Heifer Class)
5. There will be a trophy awarded only if there is a minimum of four market heifers entered at weigh-in.

CROSSBRED STEER

1. All steers not eligible to show as a breed steer, a dairy steer or in All Other Breeds – will be shown as crossbreds.
2. Any steer displaying strong dairy characteristics will be shown as a dairy steer.

BREED STEER

1. To qualify as Breed Beef Steer, the animal must be registered with a Beef Breed Association.
2. The original copy of the registration paper for the animal must be brought to the weigh-in in August.
 - A) The animal must be registered in the exhibitor name or the name of the immediate family.
 - B) At the weigh-in/tagging in December, if the animal is registered in the exhibitor's name, the animal must be entered and showed by that exhibitor only and is not eligible for the family market animal or can be entered as the family market animal project.

- 3. Animal must have a legible tattoo which will be checked at the Mercer County Fair.
- 4. Breed animals must have 3 in a class or they will automatically go into an AOB (all other breeds) class. An animal that is checked in at the fall weigh-in as a breed steer will show as a breed steer at the Mercer County Fair. That animal cannot be switched over to show with the crossbred steers.
- 5. The breed program will cease to exist if less than six breed steers are weighed-in in December.
- 6. The breed program will cease to exist if less than six breed steers are shown at the 2020 Mercer County Fair.

SHOWMANSHIP

- 1. Exhibitors will be allowed to show their siblings animals in showmanship classes. (Siblings defined as sisters/brothers, step siblings and half siblings)
- 2. Those eligible for Professional Showmanship are: Previous winners of the senior or professional division and winners of all 2020 Beef Showmanship classes only. Once you win in the Professional division, you may not show in any division except professional.

SHOWMANSHIP

- 1st 15 points
 - 2nd 13 points
 - 3rd 11 points
 - 4th 9 points
 - 5th 7 points
 - Skillathon Based on the number of questions
- You can receive points only once in showmanship. If you show in professional you will receive 1 additional point, but no points for placing 1st through 5th unless professional showmanship is the only class you were eligible to compete in.

Herdsman award tie-breaker. If there is a tie after the above mentioned criteria, an additional point will be awarded to those that attend pen set up before the fair.

Cleanliness Stalls, animals, and area assigned to you will be checked twice for a total of 10 points.

Skillathon Based on the number of questions. **If there is a tie after the above mentioned criteria, each participant will receive a trophy**

DAIRY CATTLE DEPARTMENT POLICIES

- 1. Exhibitors are to wear white polo shirt with nice blue jeans. ADDITIONAL DRESS CODE APPLIES. SEE GENERAL LIVESTOCK POLICIES.
- 2. Classes will be shown by alternating Holstein classes with the colored breed classes.
- 3. All animals in the herd class must belong to the same exhibitor.
- 4. Anyone showing in any Junior Fair class must be a Junior Fair exhibitor.
- 5. All dairy animals must be in place by 9 p.m., Thursday day before fair begins..
- 6. An exhibitor may show one entry per class.
- 7. Dairy animals in production (except for Supreme Champion) may leave the fairgrounds after the Junior Fair Show, but are not allowed to return to the fairgrounds.
- 8. Dairy exhibitors will earn \$5 for completing Dairy Skillathon.

DAIRY HERDSMAN AWARD

Award will be given to the individual with the highest score on the skillathon in each respective division. In case of a tie, an additional award will be given.

1. A member may exhibit:
 - a. A maximum of 2 animals in each dairy class.
 - b. A maximum of 2 animals in any other breeds class.
2. All health regulations apply. See health rules.
3. All Lamancha goats must be tattooed in the tail web.
4. Horns: maximum of 1 inch scurs
5. Any recognized dairy goat breed will be accepted in production (dairy)classes.
6. Dairy Goat exhibitors will earn \$5 for completing Dairy Goat Skillathon.
7. All goats are to be kept in designated goat area.
8. Only goats entered in the fair are allowed on the grounds. No young, nursing goats unless these animals are entered in fair classes.
9. DRESS CODE RULES APPLY. SEE GENERAL LIVESTOCK POLICES.
10. All registered goats must have a premise letter and number, registration papers of purebred animals & clear legible tattoo done prior to exhibition.
11. Non-registered dairy goats MUST have scrapie tag in their ear.
12. All dairy goat animals will be checked for proper tagging at 9 am Friday of fair. If identification is not done properly the exhibitor may be ineligible to show and animals will need to leave the fairground.
13. If an animal is placed in any other non-meat breed class, it still must

be a production animal and therefore a doe.

POLICIES

1. There will be no adding of any entries to any classes after you participate in your skillathon. Participants may elect to drop their names from a class roster until the time of the show/class.
2. Each horse exhibitor will earn one premium for completing skillathon.
3. All health regulations apply. See health rules. Coggins test is not required for the Junior Fair show.
4. A member can ID up to three horses, but a member is permitted to a maximum of two animals in the Junior Fair Show. A mare and foal (production class entry) count as one animal. All identification papers, lease agreements and "Permission to Participate" forms are due in the OSU Extension office by May 1, current year.
5. Any one horse will be permitted to be used in Junior Fair Horse Show Competition by only one exhibitor. No horse can be used by more than one exhibitor.
6. If an animal can not be shown due to death, lameness, sickness or unruliness, the exhibitor must contact the Extension office. An advisory committee and veterinarian will verify the animal's condition. Based on that verification, if an animal is permitted for substitution the exhibitor may enter and show the animal in a showmanship and horsemanship class only. Ribbons and premiums will be awarded but trophies and other special awards will not be given. A substitute animal will be allowed only in the case that the exhibitor did not enter two animals by the skillathon date deadline and would not have any animal with which to participate in the Junior Fair show. If an animal is not exhibited, the project will be entered as complete if the member has participated in the skillathon.
7. All animals are to be stalled by 12 noon, Friday, at which time Junior Fair Horse committee members will check animal entries against identification forms on file.
8. Each horse and exhibitor which will be participating in the Junior Fair must attend at least three Equine Work Nights at the Mercer County Fairgrounds prior to the beginning of the fair. The horse must be ridden by the exhibitor to determine suitability for showing with other horse and exhibitors.
9. Versatility entries are due at the Skillathon. (Versatility entries will be made with intent only, pending qualification during shows). Must place 1-5 in one of the following: Showmanship, Hunter Under Saddle, Western Pleasure or Poles.
10. All Junior Fair Horse Show participants must wear approved helmets while participating in any riding meetings, work nights and competitions.

ELIGIBILITY / PARTICIPATION

1. "Beginner" is an experience classification and not an age classification. Eligibility in Beginner classes is one year only. A first-year Junior Fair participant is not required to participate in Beginner classes, but may enter Junior or Senior classes according to age (see class descriptions). This may include an experienced rider on a novice horse.
2. If a participant chooses to enter in the Beginner Showmanship and Walk & Trot classes, no entry or participation will be permitted in any three-gaited classes in the Junior Fair Show. Beginner entrants may participate only in the Beginner Showmanship, Walk Trot Pleasure, and Beginner Horsemanship and Ground Roping.

OWNERSHIP AND/OR CARE OF ENTRY ANIMALS

1. Horses and ponies used as project animals must be owned by the member, the member's family, or be a leased animal. If an animal is leased, a leasing agreement must be filed with the Extension Office by May 1, current year.
2. Any animal exhibited in Junior Fair classes must be in continual care of the owner/lessor by May 1, current year. Boarding of an animal is permitted, providing that the member/exhibitor is feeding, cleaning, and caring for the horse.
3. Lessons, instructions, and advice for members/exhibitors are

encouraged. With the member present in a learning situation, such assistance may include occasional riding and handling of the horse by another person but can not include regular training and care of the horse within 30-days of competition in any county or state Junior Fair horse show. If a project animal is shown by someone other than the Junior Fair member in an open or breed show during the 30 days prior to the Junior Fair competition, the member/exhibitor must be present and must show the project animal in that show.

VERSATILITY

1. Exhibitors must have completed one year (must be in second year) of showing in Junior Fair Horse Shows to participate.
2. Equipment: Each team must place all supplies used for the contest in the specified area. All supplies must be in place 15 minutes before the contest starts or be disqualified. At this time the judge will check each team's supplies. No one except participants are allowed in the make-up area until the end of the contest (each team will be allowed one spotter and should only assist in emergency cases-the spotter is not allowed to coach the team). Participants should be dressed for Showmanship, Hunter Under Saddle, Western Pleasure, and Poles.
3. The judge will post a showmanship pattern at 12:30 PM. or earlier.
4. Assistants (can have two) must be a currently enrolled Junior Fair member in Mercer County. If you need help finding someone to be an assistant, please see your advisor. Out of county Junior Fair exhibitor will only be used if no Mercer County Junior Fair exhibitors are available. Assistants should dress appropriately-jeans, boots that are above the ankles, and sleeveless or short sleeve shirts. No tank or strapless tops.
5. Points will be awarded in the following manner (for each of the four classes):

1st place	5 points
2nd place	4 points
3rd place	3 points
4th place	2 points
5th place	1 point
6. Winners of each class will not be announced until the end of competition. In the event of a tie, the judge will determine a tie breaker.
7. There will be a 10 minute tack change between each class (time starts when horses arrive at the wagon), failure to get tack changed in 10 minutes will result in disqualification.

HIGH POINT

- All classes will be used to determine the Hi-Point Award. Points will be awarded in the following manner:
